



Not in Our School– Hate Crime Awareness Poster Competition 2017

Cheshire Constabulary has been working alongside local schools to increase knowledge about hate crime with the help of pupils. The force launched its "Not in Our School" poster competition asking young people to design a piece of artwork that would help prevent hate crime within schools and the community they serve.

You're Safe With Us

After reports of post-referendum hate crime - initial figures from the National Police Chiefs' Council showed a 57% rise in reported incidents - a Twitter user encouraged people to wear a safety pin to show solidarity with immigrants living in the UK.

The **safety pin**, worn visibly to others **became a symbol in the fight against racism** in the wake of the Brexit vote.

Enrichment groups worked with Mrs Underhill, using wire to recreate and celebrate the patterns from different ethnic and religious groups living in the UK.



Each student made a safety pin to symbolise their own tolerance and support of immigrant groups and to show that 'You're safe with me'. We extended the message on behalf of the whole of The Macclesfield Academy to say 'You're safe with us' and 'You're safe here'.

'On the Bexton School Council this year, we have made some changes to the lunchtimes so that the juniors can go last and get seconds (if they are still hungry), instead of the infants. We have also changed break time and now we run clubs like athletics, reading and netball. In each class we have also made worry boxes. If you are upset or worried about something, you can put it in the box and the teacher can see it.

My favourite thing we have done is going to the Town Council chambers and meeting the Mayor. In the future, we plan to make a friendship bench for if you are lonely at playtime.'


